"I will never tell," said Stickly-Prickly, "but you can scoop me out of my shell if you like."

"Aha!" said the Jaguar, "Now I know you're a Tortoise!" And as he scooped at Stickly-Prickly, his paw was filled with painful prickles. He whimpered and cried, and the Hedgehog quickly rolled away.

"No, no," said Slow-Solid, "You've got it all wrong, I'm the Tortoise!" But the Jaguar did not trust him. Angrily, he pushed the Tortoise into the river in hopes that he'd uncoil. But the Tortoise swam and swam until he got to the other side, where he met his friend Stickly-Prickly. They laughed as they heard the Jaguar roar in anger, calling for his mother's help.





"Where are the people that attacked you?" cried the Tribe of Tegumai.


"No one attacked us," said Tegumai. "We've seen nobody but that Stranger-man you have there."







you warm milk three times a day forever and ever."


With that the Cat returned to the Wild Wood by himself, waving his wild tail as he went.
